#### The Conference Theme

Globalization is bringing about a new era of transnational relationships and pervasive international communications, thereby impacting local identities, values, and cultures (Stromquist & Monkman, 2014). As is evident in the contemporary world of increasing interconnection and dynamism, multicultural societies are a new reality, and the prevalent thought is that all societies will inevitably become more culturally diverse. Given this context, many scholars argue that interculturalism will be a new model for mediating changes within diverse societies. Globalization is bringing about a new paradigm of super-diversity which is resulting in all societies becoming more culturally diverse. One of the results of globalisation is interculturalism. This latter is a new model which responds to this increasing diversity, it rejects all forms of discrimination based on differences and embraces reciprocity and accommodation.

Higher education institutions are now moving beyond solely nurturing linguistically competent students to aiming at developing interculturally competent students able to function effectively in today's multicultural environments. This shift in the aims of language education is yielded by the demands brought up by the neoliberalism of the world with its industry, economy, and education. Hence, this conference aims at adding to the traditional interests of language instruction by implementing a global intercultural view.

#### **Objectives of the conference**

- This conference gathers new views and perspectives of interculturality as its underpinning for educational, societal, and identity development/mapping.
- This conference aims to promote and facilitate new multifaceted approaches to one of the core issues of our time namely globalization and the forms of intercultural flows and growth that it entails.
- This conference would contribute to raising awareness of how current intercultural flows cut across the world of education, and its impact on societies and institutions and educational practices around the world.
- The conference presents those taking part in it with three unique dimensions of experience, encouraging interdisciplinary discussion, facilitating heightened intercultural awareness and promoting international educational exchange.

In many educational settings and contexts throughout the world, there remains an assumption that teachers are the possessors of knowledge which is to be imparted to students, and that this happens in neutral, impartial and objective ways. However, learning is about making meaning, and learners can experience the same teaching in very different ways. Students (as well as teachers) are part of complex social, cultural, political, ideological and personal circumstances, and current learning experiences will depend in part on previous ones, as well as on age,

gender, social class, culture, ethnicity, varying abilities and more. This conference is an intellectual and educational gathering that represents a quality opportunity to explore common themes in education and develop a research agenda which develops interdisciplinary discussion on themes ranging from foreign language instruction, the impact of globalization on learners' and teachers' identities, to implications of interculturalism on students' learning, identities, and interculturalism.
